Recycling Redux A Reminder to Recycle

In 1988, Pennsylvania enacted Act 101, requiring some municipalities within the state to adopt a recycling program for their residents. Stroudsburg is one of those communities affected by Act 101, and in 1990 an Ordinance was passed establishing the Borough's own recycling program.

So, what exactly is this program and what are you required to do as a resident of Stroudsburg?

Recyclables are collected every two weeks curbside. The Borough is divided into three pick-up areas; depending on your location, your pick-up will be on Tuesdays, Wednesday or Thursdays. A list of zones and a schedule of pick-up dates for the rest of the year are included inside this newsletter.

What recyclable items are part of curbside pick-up? Items include paper products, newspaper, magazines, cardboard & junk mail; glass jars and bottles; aluminum cans & foil; and plastic bottles. Please see inside for more details on curbside pick-up.

Why should residents recycle? It reduces the amount sent to landfills and it preserves crucial natural resources. And most importantly, it's the law. The Stroudsburg Borough Code, §20-202, makes curbside pick-up of recyclables <u>mandatory</u> for all residents. Penalties include fines of up to \$600. When you don't recycle, you are violating the law and depriving our community of much needed income through the sale of recyclables. And remember, when you recycle, you are helping to keep taxes rates down!

Our recycling partner is East Stroudsburg; the Twin Boroughs Recycling Center is the hub of both municipalities recycling programs. Located behind Walmart on Lincoln Avenue in East Stroudsburg, the Twin Boroughs Recycling Center is open Monday—Saturday to drop (*Continued Page 3*)

Stormwater Pollution and You

Keeping Our Waterways Clean is Everyone's Responsibility

Stroudsburg Borough is literally surrounded by water. With Broadhead Creek to the East, McMichael Creek in the South, and Little Pocono and Pocono Creeks in the West and North, our waterways are very much a part of the daily life of our community. And keeping our many waterways clean is critically important for the community's wellbeing. It also is ultimately the responsibility of all residents.

Stormwater runoff occurs when precipitation from rain or snowmelt flows over the ground; impervious surfaces like sidewalks and streets prevent stormwater from naturally soaking into the ground. As stormwater flows over streets, lawns and sidewalks, it picks up debris, chemicals, dirt and other pollutants. Like most communities, the stormwater runoff collected by our municipal stormwater sewer system discharges directly into our waterways without treatment. Pollution runoff is our Nation's single greatest threat to clean water.

By practicing healthy household habits, residents can keep common pollutants like pesticides, pet waste, grass clippings and automotive fluids off of the ground and out of stormwater. Follow these simple steps to help keep our waterways clean:

- Wash your car on the lawn (not the street or driveway), or take your car to a commercial car wash.
- Plant lots of trees, shrubs, and ground cover.
- NEVER dump used oil down the drain or onto the ground.
- Always pick-up after your pet and throw in the trash.
- Use a rain barrel to catch and store water for gardens.
- Redirect down spouts from paved areas to vegetated areas and make sure they are not entering the sewer system!
- Use porous materials (i.e. wooden planks and bricks) for walkways and patios.
- Grade driveway and walkways to direct water flow toward vegetated areas.
- Volunteer to help with the Brodhead Watershed Association.

Stroudsburg Borough Budget & Finances 2022 | What You Need to Know

As the leaves turn to many colors and the temperature drops, the attentions of elected and appointed municipal officials turn to... the next year's budget! PA law states that all municipalities must have a budget in place by December 31st for the upcoming year. What do you, as a resident, need to know about the upcoming budget process?

To know where you are going, you need to know where you have been. Borough Manager Larry Kopp did an in-depth study of the past five years of finances to help Council prepare for the 2022 Budget process. This study was presented to the Finance Committee, and then to full Council at the September 7th Council Meeting.

Overall, the Borough's financial position remains strong. The Borough has substantial funds on hand— \$10.2 Million in the Borough's 10 Funds—to confront any emergencies. In 2020, the Borough's revenue only dropped 1.6%, which was remarkable in the year of COVID. That



small loss, combined with judicious cost saving measures, made the financial "hit" from COVID less than expected. Police costs are low, around 40% of the General Fund Budget; some municipalities spend as much as 70%. And 2021 looks to be a great year financially, with all funds under budget for expenses and income stronger than expected.

What concerns were noted in the financial study? Expenses have been rising, although within budgeted levels. 2022 will call for an across the board look at expenses and making judicious cuts without affecting necessary services. Health Insurance costs have been rising. Earned revenue needs to be maximized to lessen the need for property tax increases. No serious concerns, just a need for careful planning in 2022.

A Reminder to Borough Residents to Recycle


(Continued from Page 1) off recyclables. Electronic devices can be dropped off at the Recycling Center as well.

And what are those plans for 2022? Firstly, publish requests for proposals for majors expenditures in 2022, including health insurance, to ensure the lowest prices. Work on maximizing income from fines and fees, aligning them with the actual costs incurred. Work on collecting back due sewer fees and liens. And work on developing a long-term financial plan, looking out 10 years. Finally, Borough payments on two major past projects come to an end in 2022, removing \$507,000 in expenses, helping ease the overall financial burden.

What's not going to change in 2022? Great service to residents, including infrastructure upgrades! We are going to pave a portion of Thomas Street as well as replacing a portion of the sewer main on Ann Street, using federal grant funds. And we are going to be automating our permitting systems, greatly increasing efficiency and providing better service to residents.

Recycling Information for Stroudsburg Borough

Curbside Recycling

- Please have your recyclables out along the curb by 5:00 am on the day of pick-up.
- Ö Keep your recycling pail in a visible location.
- Use your pails for glass & aluminum cans. •
- Do not break glass before placing it in the pail. •
- Do not place light bulbs, mirrors, or items made of clay or Ö laminated glass in with your recyclables.

Items for Curbside Pick-Up

NEWSPAPERS, MAGAZINES, CARDBOARD & JUNK MAIL

Bundle newspapers in brown paper bags or tie with cord. Do not tape them together or bundle in plastic bags. Magazines and junk mail may be combined but kept separate from paper. Cardboard must be broken down and tied.

GLASS JARS/BOTTLES (BROWN, CLEAR & GREEN)

Sort bottles by color. Rinse out bottles. Labels may be left on. No windowpane, blue bottles or ceramic glass are accepted.

ALUMINUM CANS & FOIL

Rinse and flatten aluminum cans.

PLASTIC BOTTLES

Please rinse bottles and tubs, remove caps & crush to save space. Plastic bottles and tubs with Nos. 1-7 are accepted. NO MOTOR OIL BOTTLES! No black plastic. You may put your plastic bottles in a garbage bag.
